 - A Grommes-Precision AXIOM 250 Amplifier, CyberPower CP1000PFCLCD Uninterruptible Power Supply, and Grommes-Precision Speaker Lightning Suppressor were added to the Schulmerich Carillon. The integrated amplifier of the carillon was damaged most likely by a lightning strike to the trumpet speakers in the belfry. This caused a noticeable hum. After consultation with Schulmerich this recommendation was approved by the trustees. These items were funded by a donation from Eldon Mayer and acquired and installed by Cheryl Stevens. In addition Dave Stevens refinished a small cabinet which now houses the Carillon, UPS, and Lightning Suppressor in the balcony.



Chebeague Community Church Food Pantry Report

The food pantry typically has served families/individuals with food insecurity. With the Covid crisis the pantry expanded its services in April of 2020 to provide fresh produce, protein, and limited dairy products for all islanders in order to assist in minimizing trips to the mainland. In May of 2021 the pantry discontinued weekly offerings of fresh produce, proteins, and shelf stable items and returned to the more traditional model that it operated under pre Covid. However, the needs of the island continue, perhaps not in the traditional sense of financial need but more with regard to our neighbors and a desire to minimize exposure due to personal concerns regarding the current pandemic. Some of our neighbors are also finding it increasingly difficult to



navigate getting to the store to meet their nutritional needs. Because of this the pantry started providing monthly boxes in November for families and individuals to help support them with fresh produce and protein. A box was also provided in December and the current plan is to continue with monthly boxes for the foreseeable future.

In addition to the monthly boxes Hannaford gift cards are available to assist those who experience financial hardship. The pantry remains open to the community in order for them to "shop our shelves" but an appointment is required as the Parish House continues to be locked due to the ongoing pandemic.

The Food Pantry continues to be available for any and all in our community should they find themselves in need.

We are so grateful for all our volunteers: Polly Wentworth, Kel Haney, Jessie Graham, Kendra McKinnon, and Vicki Emery. Thank you as well to Barry Fitzsimmons and Genaro Balzano, in addition to all those who have stepped in when needed who are too many to name!

It's been a year full of deep work - both in navigating the shifting landscape of the pandemic and in emerging from the shadow of the United Methodist Church. I want to share with you an overview of the work I've done this year - work that I believe sets the grounds for where God may be leading us in the future.

<u>COVID</u>

There's no way to get around how disruptive the pandemic has been for us sharing the fullness of life together. While deep community can form in digital spaces, there's no substitute for being able to eat and sing together. We worshiped remotely for the first half of 2021, found times to worship outdoors (like Ash Wednesday sunset service, Easter sunrise, and a few Sunday mornings), and enacted protocols to worship indoors.

Worship attendance, even with the introduction of remote access, has not gone back to prepandemic levels. There are a variety of reasons for this having to do with people evaluating their own risk factors, preferences, folks who are out of the habit, and more. **COVID has raised questions across mainline Protestant and Catholic congregations nationally around what it means to gather together and be church when worship isn't the primary driver of life together. The question I think about isn't necessarily how to get folks "back" into worship, but in what ways can we adapt to address a need that worship isn't serving in the same way for some people?**

I continued to serve on the island's Community Advisory Response Team (CART) as co-chair. This year, that group was able to offer vaccination clinics and booster clinics thanks to the Recompense Grant sponsored by our congregation. CART continued to provide information on where to get masks, access services, get tested, and more. This committee helps keep our island prepared and informed. I am thankful that we have dedicated community members of all types who give time to keep our community safe and that we have a place to communicate around our different organizations' responses to the pandemic.

Disaffiliation

Of course, leaving the United Methodist Church took up much of our time and attention this year. We discerned that it was time to take this step, and my role in the discernment process was to hold space for the congregation to make this decision - to raise questions for consideration and listen and pray as you discussed and shared and discerned. I am immensely proud that this was a decision you all reached together - from the start of this process to the end, this was led by you all. You took a stand against the exclusionary and punitive measures of the UMC that actively harm our LGBTQIA+

siblings and decided to leave so that your church could truly be a place for all people. This is an achievement that makes a huge difference.



Once the decision was made at our last ever charge conference as a UMC back in February, there was still much work to do, from gathering reports, cataloging our assets, and entering into negotiations - again, work that was done primarily by you all.

Throughout this journey, people from other discerning and disaffiliating congregations in New England were meeting weekly for planning, support, and resourcing. Gloria and Lola were two folks who also participated regularly in these meetings. Another source of connection during this time came through Grandview

Church in Lancaster, PA. I reached out to them following their disaffiliation from the United Methodist Church and shared that there were three congregations in New England taking that step soon. Since then, we have been meeting monthly, dreaming together about a new way of connecting and relating with each other as churches and how we might support, equip, and celebrate ministry together.

As we moved toward Annual Conference in June, where the body would vote on our disaffiliation (along with those of our sister congregations HopeGateWay and Tuttle Road). I, along with Linda Brewster and Sarah Ewing-Merrill, were tasked by the sessions committee of the New England conference to share at a pre-conference gathering on behalf of the churches we serve about our process of discernment and to answer any questions people might have had about what we were doing. We were also tasked with presenting the formal legislation to the session of the New England Annual Conference for it to act upon.

I think we all know the eventual outcome, which is something to celebrate, and the meeting exposed just how toxic a system we were leaving behind. Personally, I have understood my call from God to be grounded in this place, serving the people of Chebeague. I had hoped that while the congregation stepped away from the denomination, the UMC would continue to hold my credentials as a licensed

local pastor while I discerned my own personal next steps for credentialing. While the clergy session of the New England Conference was willing to make accommodations and had voted as such, the bishop asked me to surrender my license this fall after Chebeague had disaffiliated. Along with my license, I submitted a letter outlining that I was handing it in not because he asked, but because of the disrespectful and dishonorable behavior he allowed on the floor of Annual Conference, maligning me and my clergy sisters. The work of healing from the spiritual trauma I experienced this summer continues, and I am grateful



for the notes of encouragement I've received from you all - and for those of you who took the time to sign my license! I have a copy as a reminder of your affirmation and support for my ministry here.

You all worked hard to meet a September 1st deadline for disaffiliation - earlier than we had previously set. You dispatched folks to raise an enormous sum of money to cover our pro rata share of the conference's Unfunded Pension Liability, you wrote bylaws, you wrote letters to members - and so much more. When we became the Chebeague Community Church on September 1st, we did so knowing that there would be things that we'd have to figure out and live into. I'm grateful that since September 1st, we were able to take in 8 new members, 1 new associate member, and list 17 people as friends of the CCC. I hope in the years ahead more folks will decide to take the step of membership and friendship with us - especially those young folks among us who are the church in ways that we have yet to celebrate and embrace. **We continue to work hard to set a strong foundation for the Chebeague Community Church - and we are certainly in ministry together!**

As part of building the Chebeague Community Church, we hosted a dream session at the beginning of November, where we invited conversation around what programs and activities folks would like to see us offer. What ended up surfacing in conversation was a desire to engage young people, thanksgiving for all the programs and ministries we currently offer (like Ladies Aid, the Food Pantry, mission trips to Guatemala), and wondering about creating small groups in order to create a presence in the community. One member talked about risk taking and that we have to be willing to fail as we engage in ministry together. Others mentioned inviting community members to write a paragraph about what the church means to them? What do you want to see happen? It was noted that there is wide community support for the church but that that doesn't always translate into engagement. We ended our time with a few folks sharing deeply around their hopes and what drew them to membership: hearing sermons that mean her life, her family's life, her neighbor's lives matter; the care and concern the church expressed for her in her time of need; and a sense of being at home and grounded in a spiritual community.

There is much more listening to be had as we engage with the community and how we can create spiritual community around Christ together.

<u>Worship</u>

I appreciate those of you who rode the waves while we were making decisions around the best/safest way to gather for worship, and those of you who live for part of the year away from the island who waited patiently until WiFi was installed in the sanctuary!



We did a few worship series together this year - all from A Sanctified Art. For Lent, we explored themes of "Cultivating and Letting Go" - asking what God was growing within us and what we needed to let go of so that God could bring new things forth from the soil of our lives. In the summer, we spent some time with "I've Been Meaning to Ask" - where we talked about how we encounter and relate to one another from positions of curiosity and deep listening - seeking to create transformative community by the way we hold space for each other.

Lastly, over Advent, we did "Those who Dream" and explored being a people who dare to live out God's dreams for this world, much like those who we encounter in the story of Jesus' birth.

I'm thankful that for part of the summer, while we were meeting in-person, Kate Nyhan provided music for us. If you haven't had the opportunity yet, please drop her a note of thanks!

I am thankful for the worship committee that formed in the fall to help with the logistics and the creative aspect of our worship together - Denise Hamilton, Gloria Brown, Betsy Gaston, Cathy MacNeill, and Polly Wentworth.

Pastoral Care

This year, it was challenging to do much visiting, as many places changed protocols throughout the year in response to COVID. It is really helpful to me to know if someone would appreciate a visit from the pastor while they are in the hospital or in a rehab facility. I rely on the church community's input in this area to know what follow-up would be helpful from a church perspective.

I meet monthly with the residents at the Island Commons and have had wonderful conversations. We have a treasure here in this facility and its staff who care so deeply for the folks who live there. Our times have been both in-person indoors, in-person outdoors, and over Zoom. We've had times of devotional and prayer, times of one-on-one visitation, and more.

COVID has caused more than one funeral to be put on hold, however I was privileged to preside over a few services this past year - a graveside for Margaret Gaston, a graveside for Peter Hall, a graveside for Jane Harrington, and both a funeral and committal for Ginny Ballard. I'm reminded in each service of the wonderful gift it is to be in this space with folks in the midst of their grief and remembering, and the wonderful legacy left behind that those who are living are tasked with carrying on. **Each service inevitably turns into a time of sharing stories and blessed memories; we have a rich heritage here and I pray for the ways we can remember, celebrate, give thanks, and take what we've learned from generations past and move forward towards health and wholeness together.**

Continuing Education

One of the silver linings of the pandemic is the ability to attend webinars over Zoom! Conferences that normally would have been held in-person went virtual, meaning it was easier to participate.

This year, I continued seeing my spiritual director - a practice that I engage in for my spiritual health and well-being. If you are someone who is interested in meeting with a spiritual director - a person who is trained to help you discover God in the midst of your every day life - talk to me!

I also finished up a leadership coaching program I did with Beth Estock. **Her coaching enabled me to identify goals for myself as a leader and not just achieve them through reflection and journaling, but through embodied practice that helped me engage emotionally with myself.** I firmly believe that if I hadn't engaged her as a coach and had her training in my pocket (and in my body!) as I went through the trauma of Annual Conference, I would be far worse off. I was able to attend Nevertheless She Preached virtually with other women from our sister congregations. Nevertheless She Preached is an organization devoted to dismantling patriarchal structures and elevating the voices of those on the margins. Speakers at this conference, themed "Embrace Healing, Embody Hope" included Dr. Alicia Reyes-Barriéntez, Rev. Dr. Valerie Bridgeman, Kaitlin Curtice, Rev. Dr. Lindsey Jodrey, Kathy Khang, Dr. Jennifer Owens-Jofré, Rev. Kyndall Rae Rothaus, Rev. Dr. Irie Session, and Rev. Dr. Angela Yarber. These women are phenomenal preachers, sharing deep wisdom and a refreshing Word from God.

Lastly, in December 2021, I visited Spring Forest in Hillsborough, North Carolina (<u>https://www.springforest.org/</u>), which includes an intentional neo-monastic community and a church that surrounds a working farm and CSA. I was able to spend time with Elaine Heath, abbess of the community, who is also an author and theologian and the former dean of Duke Divinity School.



The community is a missional, monastic, and teaching community that embodies an ethic of rest, healing, and regenerative agriculture. Their work flows out of a contemplative stance (show up, pay attention, cooperate with God, release the outcome) that has led to their development of a CSA as their model of financial sustainability, works and advocates for refugee resettlement and immigrant rights, and more. What binds

them together (the church and intentional community) is a shared rule of life: Prayer together, Working together, Eating together, and Loving their neighbor together. Their philosophy of ministry is "failing forward" where experimentation is key. **Their ethos promotes adaptability and the ability to pivot based on a changing landscape and changing needs.**

One of the most important learnings from that time (aside from the reminder that church and a lived faith can take many different forms and congregationalism is but one of many expressions of spiritual community) is the idea of holding strategic intentions as opposed to strategic goals. Goals are great, but sometimes circumstances beyond our control mean that meeting our goals is challenging. Just look at how disruptive COVID has been for so many people. Moving toward strategic intentions (or, in Christian language, a rule of life, or set of values) allows an organization to ask and evaluate "how are we living out our values". It shifts towards being more process-oriented and harkens back to the early church in many respects; the early Christians were known as followers of The Way because it was about a shared way of life and a way of showing up in the world.

What is Next?

This leads me to think about what is next for us as the CCC for 2022. We've been through a lot. We've achieved a lot. We have completed our disaffiliation from the United Methodist Church and yet the fullness of who we are as the Chebeague Community Church has not yet come to fruition. We are in a liminal space where we are not who we were any more and not quite yet who we are to be.

My hope for this year is that it is a year of rest. We did something big together; praise God for God's faithfulness to us and for our faithfulness in heeding this daring vision God placed before us of a place where all are welcome, where our LGBTQ siblings and their families are embraced, where it doesn't matter what or who you are - we see you as a child of God and welcome you in. I hear how hard we worked and how much that took out of us as a people - and while there is still business to tend to and gatherings to be had (worship!), my prayer for us is to take a big breath out together. **My hope for 2022 is that this is a year of deep listening - to the community, to each other, and to God.** I believe that the primary work of the Council this year is to be in formation together - to let our meeting time together be one of nurture and not expenditure, to let business take a second seat to learning and growing together, to spend some time with our values (strategic intentions) and consider what we are doing in light of what we profess to value. (Need a refresher? Our values are community, fellowship, rootedness, creativity, inclusivity, and innovation).

This is where I think back to the quotes I referred to at the beginning of this report. In this season of waiting and listening and discerning - patience is needed. We attend upon a God whose presence transcends time and space and people. Our invitation is to listen and be faithful and tend to each other (I think back, as well, to our Christmas letter which encouraged tending to the small things which make our life so rich). God is the source of our life together - and if we pay attention to what

God is about, if we seek to grow in ministry together, reading off the same page, working in harmony (note: sometimes harmony is discordant, but it eventually resolves and that's the beauty in music!) - it is all to glorify and witness to the work of God who brings all things into wholeness.

Personally, I know that I need to tend to my own work of healing and moving past the grief and trauma of my own separation from the UMC. I need a season that is marked more by abiding and inner work. I look forward to joining one of Jessie Graham's <u>Atlas of the Heart</u> by Brene Brown's groups. I may look into other areas of professional support as well as part of my healing. **My priorities in terms of pastoral leadership as we enter this season of rest and contemplation are Sunday morning worship, responding to crises that come up (funerals, community crises, etc), and community listening. I will also be reengaging the Pastor's Prayer List, where over the course of 2022, I will be in prayer for each person that is connected to the CCC in some fashion. They will receive a letter from me inviting specific prayer requests.**

I also hope to learn more about Celtic spirituality this year. I have felt drawn to learn more about this thread of Christian thought and practice - one that actually was marginalized because of the ways it incorporated nature into its theology. I have a stack of books to work through!

Family Notes:

On another personal note, we continue to navigate the uncertainties of the pandemic. Genevieve at 2 ½ is not yet eligible for the vaccine. We had to schedule intentional time for Ben's reaction to the booster, knowing that his chronic illness interferes with vaccines of all types. While all three of us have all the recommended vaccines and boosters we are eligible for, we continue to be careful as both Ben and I have conditions that put us at higher risk for long-COVID should we get the virus. After experiencing one unanticipated health crisis this past year (Ben's appendectomy), we are not anxious for another one!

We also continue to work on 54 Firehouse road and hope to move in between Memorial Day and Labor Day. We are excited to put roots down on the island in this way and are so thankful for people who have pitched in by watching our kids so that we could work on the house together, allowed us to borrow equipment, given us advice, and more.

Ben formally stepped down as the Music Director this year when we resumed in-person worship and is working at the BTS Center as the Director of Applied Research - where the organization as a whole is looking at the intersection of climate devastation and the changing religious landscape and asking the questions of what faithful leadership looks like in this moment.

Michael continues to thrive in Kindergarten this year and Genevieve enjoys Kids' Place and we are thankful to these institutions that serve our children and many of the island's children so well.

Thank you for taking the time to read this report - may we lean together into the rest that God invites us into for the coming year.
